# CHAPTER **1**

#### A Coach for Correction

Correction is What Makes a Champion

"When Peter came to Antioch, I opposed him to his face, because he was clearly in the wrong."

~Galatians 2:11

I am reminded of a very good book that I read a few years ago entitled: "*Be Quick, but Do not Hurry* "by Andrew Hill. The book is about coaching and life principles by the legendary UCLA Basketball Coach, John Wooden.

John Wooden has been one of the most beloved basketball coaching icons in college basketball history. One of the principles I noticed that Coach Wooden would demonstrate is how the team should run an offensive play, pass the ball, block out or defend.

He would demonstrate it to the players first; afterward, he would have the players repeatedly practice what he demonstrated over and over again. He would make corrections to what the players did. The interesting point this book makes is that he would then disappear and sit way up in the basketball arena where the players could not see him and watch them constantly do what he had just taught and demonstrated. He would then have a larger view of other things that needed to be corrected. Next, he would come back down out of the stands and make those corrections.

I too found this type of coaching useful and successful when coaching kids or adults in football. I could take a child as young as 5 years of age and a man as old as 35 years of age and show them the proper way to catch a football. I taught my own boys at an early age how to properly catch, throw, tackle and run passing routes.

It was fun to do and see them learn; however- none of this comes without correction. You cannot be willing to teach someone what to do and not be willing to put in the work to correct them so they can do it right. Having a coach or coaches in your life is something that we all need so we can do things right.

When you think of a coach, they are people who know more about a subject than you. No coach can teach someone who feels they have more knowledge than them on the subject. We call these lost souls—"un-coachable."

Peter, in the story at Antioch, had been corrected by the Apostle Paul on a matter that could harm the development of the new church. The Apostle Peter had a way of acting one way in front of the Jewish Christians and another way with the Gentile believers. We called this being two-faced when I was a kid.

He would not embrace his Gentile brothers in the presence of the Jewish believers. Paul, having more understanding on the development of the church than Peter, saw his duplicity and corrected him. He knew how he was treating his Gentile Christian brothers in front of the Jews was clearly wrong. In fact, what Peter was doing had nothing to do with the truth of who all the gospel was intended for. Paul, though chosen after Peter, had more insight into Jewish law and customs. Therefore, once enlightened, Paul understood the revelation of the purpose of Christ to the Gentiles as well.

Paul gives his Jewish credentials in these words:

If anyone else thinks he has reasons to put confidence in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; in regard to the law, a Pharisee; as for zeal, persecuting the church; as for legalistic righteousness, faultless.<sup>2</sup>

What Paul was trying to let the people of Philippi know is that he too erred in the faith under the Law of Moses and came to understand that salvation came through Christ as a free gift to all men, without the need for the works of the flesh.

Which brings me to this other point, coaches are people of integrity. Not only are they the people who are not afraid to mention their mistakes, but they are the people in your life that love you enough to confront you when you do wrong.

People who turn away and endorse you in your wrongdoings are not doing you any favors at all. I believe that **correction is what makes a champion.** It takes experience to figure this out. Coaches are there to make sure that you are doing things right. They keep you or get you back on course.

Peter had clearly gotten off course with the truth of the gospel. He was embarrassed to embrace his Gentile brothers in front of his Jewish clique. It was not right or keeping in line with the destiny of the gospel. The gospel had come to both Jew and Gentiles. Peter was supposed to project that to not one group, but both, regardless of whose presence he was in.

It is amazing how when we get around one group we act one way and when we are around another group we conduct ourselves in another. Paul did not care. His heart and mind was focused on the truth of Jesus Christ. He did not waste time rebuking the Jews, but instead, turned to Peter and put him in his place.

Paul knew that it was Peter's leadership that was making the Jewish believers go astray. When there is a mess, sometimes you have to turn to the person who should know better and correct them. They may not like it, but they will be left to deal with the correction themselves.

Leaders are responsible for teaching others right and wrong. This is why the enemy loves to try to discredit leaders. He knows that they have a greater purpose. If he can discredit the leader, then the people will not listen to learn the truth. Leaders have to be resilient in their effort to keep standing on the Word of God. Allow God the time to sort out confusion himself.

Correction from a coach is a good thing. It is for discipline. Even God our Father believes in the fruit that comes from correction. Here is what the writer says in the book of Hebrews 12: 4-13:

In your struggle against sin, you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding your blood. And you have forgotten that word of encouragement that addresses you as sons:

My son, do not make light of the Lord's discipline, and do not lose heart when he rebukes you, because the Lord corrects those he loves, and he punishes everyone he accepts as a son. Endure hardship as a discipline; God is treating you as sons. For what son is not disciplined by his father? If you are not disciplined then you are illegitimate children and not true sons. Moreover, we have all had human fathers who disciplined us and we respected them for it. How much more should we submit to the Father of our spirits and live! Our fathers disciplined us for a little while as they thought best; but God disciplines us for our good, that we may share in His holiness.

No discipline seems pleasant at the time. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it

Therefore, strengthen your feeble arms and weak knees. Make level paths for your feet, so that the lame may not be disabled, but rather healed.<sup>3</sup>

During my years of playing Pop-Warner football, I learned discipline on the practice field. Our coaches did not teach us that it was ok to miss practice, games, or to be late. In fact, the entire time I played, I never was late to a practice, a game or dared to miss a practice or game day. I learned discipline. Was it hard at times? Yes, it was.

I've visited the corner I used to stand at as a kid waiting for the bus to come and take me to practice. I was there everyday with my uniform on and helmet in my hand. Little did I know that being a part of Pop-Warner was shaping my life into becoming a responsible adult.

I traveled to practice further than anybody on our team. I came from a different side of town than most of the kids on my team. All the other kids lived near the practice field. I would be the first to get there and the last to get home every night, but I did it. I took the responsibility myself

to get where I needed to be, including on game day. I started learning this at age 10. My coaches did not accept any excuses.

Unfortunately, we are living in a day and time where the kids are not appreciative of such training and correction is not readily received. I recognize that we live with a more sensitive generation than in the past. People's voices want to be heard, even if what they are saying is foolishness.

The idea of being corrected seems to cause more hurt than good. What has happened to us in this day and time? Correction does not necessarily have to mean anything physical, but it more importantly means you have someone in your life that pulls you back in line when you appear to be going off the good path. The people that do this are your coaches. You should be thankful to God for them.

No one is paid to keep us on the straight and narrow. Sometimes you just need good advice; and if you are going about something wrong, then the coaches you have around you can correct what you are thinking and doing.

Understand, true coaches will never leave you, that is, if you are worth of the stay. They are always there; they do not necessarily come looking for you either. Many times you have to go to them. It is up to us to establish the mentor—student relationship with them and work within those parameters. That is your responsibility, not theirs.

Sometimes roles change, but mostly, you should have people who are the coach and you are the student. Jesus taught this principle to the people: A student is not above his teacher, but everyone who is fully trained will be like his teacher.<sup>4</sup> The purpose of you having coaches in your life is so that you can be fully trained and become like or similar to your coach. The only way you become like your coaches is to pay attention to what they say.

In today's world, the attention of our young people is focused on those who have money, music, fame, but no character. I will not deal with that issue here. You have to read my book, *The Spirit of Greed*, to get that information.

Coaches look to duplicate their efforts and build character. They have spent considerable time in learning what works. That's why it's good to have more than one coach in your life. We need to pull disciplines from each one and use them for our success.

I would have to say that I am still very optimistic about God raising up more leaders who can influence the world to good and bring correction to the way we have conducted business and live our lives.

The bottom line is that if you have coaches in your life, then you are not above your coach. God is the one who put certain people in our lives to teach us and correct us when we are wrong.
